Civil Rights Attorney Selected as the District Alumnus of the Year

Maha Ibrahim was selected as the Riverside Community College District's Alumnus of the Year. As the District's 66th recipient, she joins a distinguished group of alumni who have received this special recognition. Ibrahim attended then-



Riverside Community College from 2002-04, serving as the District's student trustee from 2003-04 and the College's commencement speaker. She went on to attend UC Berkeley and UCLA where she earned a law degree. Currently, she is a senior civil rights attorney.

While at RCC, Ibrahim and her Model UN teammates won the top prize in the 2004 Amnesty International Championship, an honor usually awarded to government organizations. Her team's unwavering stance on human rights and equality in every topic and caucus helped RCC become the first-ever community college to win this prize.

Today, she litigates on behalf of student's and women's rights.



Claire Oliveros, Ph.D., Selected as President of Riverside City College

Claire Oliveros, Ph.D., was selected as Riverside City College's 13th president. Oliveros, previously vice president of Institutional Equity & Research and Planning at Cosumnes River College in Sacramento, holds a bachelor of arts in Speech Communication from Western Oregon University; master of science in Educational Policy, Foundations and Administrative Studies from Portland State University; and a doctorate in Education from Oregon State University.

A first-generation college student and a Filipino American who was raised in the Pacific Northwest, Oliveros has sought out leadership positions that centered on diversity, equity, inclusion, belonging, access and student success. She is also a community activist. She was the founding chair of the Portland Committee for Human Rights in the Philippines and served as a board member of the Multnomah County Commission on Children, Families and Community. She received the award for Outstanding Administrator by Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, Chemeketa Community College, Salem, and was honored as one of the 100 Most Influential Filipina Women in the United States by the Filipina Women's Network.

During her career, Oliveros has overseen a number of student service divisions, including enrollment management, financial aid, outreach and orientation, counseling services, Umoja, Puente Program, TRIO Upward Bound, Extended Opportunities Program and Services, and Disability Support Programs & Services. Before relocating to California, Oliveros was assistant provost for Student Success Initiatives at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech) in Blacksburg, VA, and executive dean of Student Development and Learning Resources at Chemeketa Community College in Salem, OR.

English Professor Delivers Faculty Lecture; Makes Argument for Climate Change

Jeff Rhyne, professor of English at Moreno Valley College, delivered Riverside Community College District's 61 st Distinguished Faculty Lecture. His lecture entitled, Making Arguments Matter: Facing Climate Catastrophe and Teaching College Writing, analyzed reports on global warming and arguments about the climate crisis to theorize why more people are not alarmed, and thus more motivated, to make or advocate for impactful changes.

The Distinguished Faculty Lecture, inaugurated in 1961, is one of the most important functions for faculty, community, and students in the District. Each year, RCCD's faculty selects one of its own to present this prestigious lecture on a scholarly subject.

Rhyne earned an English degree from Pomona College in 1991, a master's degree in 1998, and then a Ph.D. in 2002 in English from the University of California, Riverside. He has been teaching since 1992 when he started his career as a high school English teacher. He subsequently taught English as a foreign language in Lithuania and at California State University, Northridge.

During his career in post-secondary education, he has taught college composition and a range of American and African American literature courses at UCR, Pomona College, University of Redlands, and Indiana University at South Bend before starting at Moreno Valley College in 2006. Rhyne earned tenure and rank of associate professor at Moreno Valley College in 2010 and was eventually promoted to full professor in 2017. He currently serves as the chair of the Department of Communications, English & World Languages, and the College's vice president of the District Faculty Association.



At the April 18, 2023 meeting of the RCCD Board of Trustees, a Land Acknowledgment Resolution (No. 57 – 22/23) was considered and passed to honoring the indigenous people who first inhabited this land and the Native Americans who continue to reside in this area today. The resolution affirms the District's intentions of maintaining the land's integrity and the Tongya (Gabrieleno), Cahuilla, Payómkawichum (Luiseño), Serrano and Cupeño tribes' legacy.
