RCCD and UCR Celebrate Groundbreaking for Student Housing Initiative

The Riverside Community College District and the University of California, Riverside celebrated the groundbreaking for the RCCD/UCR Joint North District Phase 2 housing project with a groundbreaking last November.

Secured with \$126 million funding from the state, the collaborative effort aims to enhance housing opportunities and streamline the transition into the UC system for RCCD students.

Wolde-ab Isaac, Ph.D., chancellor of the Riverside Community College District underscored the groundbreaking's importance by acknowledging the challenges faced by students in the region. "Just this past year, 20 percent of community college students and 10 percent of four-year students reported being homeless at some point during the 2022 academic year," Isaac said. "Today's groundbreaking ceremony is unique in many ways, not only because a community college and a UC are jointly building student housing inside the UC space...but it's also unique because it's meticulously and intentionally designed to break persistent, cultural and psychological barriers that many of our first-generation students experience."

The \$340 million project will provide 1,568 beds in North District Phase 2, with an anticipated occupancy date of 2025.



College Selected as an Apprenticeship Ambassador

The US Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship approved Moreno Valley College as an Apprenticeship Ambassador. The US Department of Labor's Apprenticeship Ambassador Initiative seeks to create a national network of employers, labor organizations, industry associations, program sponsors, educators, workforce intermediaries, community-based organizations, and other stakeholders to serve as champions for expanding and diversifying Registered Apprenticeship.

Only organizations with proven success experience with a registered apprenticeship program are eligible to become an Apprenticeship Ambassador. The College will serve as a champion in promoting, expanding

and diversifying registered state and federal apprenticeship opportunities for students to strengthen the region's workforce, Rosalinda Rivas, director for Apprenticeship, said.

The initiative is especially interested in expanding awareness of benefits of the apprenticeships in the US for industry, employers, career seekers, educators and communities. The ambassadors will also be tasked with identifying and scaling innovative practices and partnerships to modernize, strengthen and accelerate the adoption of apprenticeships; increasing access and support for underrepresented and underserved populations, especially women, youth, people of color, rural communities, justice-involved individuals, and people with disabilities; and communicate the business case for apprenticeships as a mainstream workforce strategy for high-demand industries while creating opportunities for good jobs for all Americans across the economy.

The College is continuing to partner with local industries to expand apprenticeship opportunities for students. The College is especially interested in developing partnerships with companies to develop industry apprenticeship hiring partners, intermediaries, community-based organizations, and workforce development partners particularly in high-demand industries.





Hernández's Story Ignites Passion

José M. Hernández, president and CEO of Tierra Luna Engineering, LLC, and a former NASA astronaut, shared his inspiring journey from humble beginnings to the outer reaches of space with students at Riverside City College.

Before a sold-out auditorium, Hernández had students hanging on his every word, ready to absorb the wisdom and determination that propelled him to greatness.

Hernández's odyssey began in the fields of California's agricultural heartland, where he worked alongside his family as migrant farmworkers. Born into a world of humble means, he spent his childhood shuttling between the United States and Mexico, a lifestyle dictated by the seasonal rhythms of the harvest. Yet, amidst the rows of crops and the scorching sun, a dream took root in his heart—a dream of reaching for the stars.

Fueling his ambition were historic trips of space exploration that captivated the world's imagination. Inspired by the iconic moonwalk mission of Apollo 17 and the stirring commentary of Walter Cronkite, Hernández knew from the tender age of 10 that he wanted to soar among the stars.



Despite facing long odds, Hernández pursued his passion for science and engineering. His journey took him from the fields of Stockton to the halls of the University of California, Santa Barbara, where he earned a master's degree in electronic engineering, signals and systems.

With continued perseverance, he carved out a career at NASA's Johnson Space Center, where he was an astronaut and part of space exploration. Selected as part of the 19th class of astronauts in 2004, he soared aboard the Space Shuttle Discovery as a mission specialist on the STS-128 mission.

During his tenure at NASA, Hernández's contributions extended beyond the confines of the spacecraft. He oversaw transfer of thousands of pounds of equipment between the shuttle and the International Space Station; played a pivotal role in robotics operations; and traversed over 5.7 million miles of celestial expanse in under two weeks.

Through The José Hernández Reaching for the Stars Foundation, he inspires the next generation of scientists, engineers and dreamers, particularly in the Central Valley.

At Riverside City College, his words resonated with the promise of possibility and the potential within each. His message was clear: no dream is too audacious, nor is any obstacle too daunting for those who dare to reach for the stars.



Community Spirit Fuels RCCD Foundation to \$5.85 Million Milestone

In a year marked by extraordinary generosity and community spirit, the Riverside Community College District Foundation achieved an unprecedented milestone, raising \$5.85 million in 2024, surpassing their initial goal of \$2.25 million.

"This achievement is more than just a number; it demonstrates the relentless commitment of our team and the incredible generosity of our donors," said Jeffry Kaatz, executive director of the RCCD Foundation. "Together, we've ensured that the aspirations of countless RCCD students will be realized, providing them with the resources they need to thrive."

Among the inspiring contributions was the heartfelt generosity of Wayne and Jane Curl, a member of the first nursing graduating class in 1959. She and her husband have been especially generous to the School of Nursing. The Curls have donated over \$330,000 in their philanthropic years, and endowed the Jane Lee Murphy, RN, BSN Endowed Nursing Scholarship.

Reflecting on her own journey, she shared how an \$80 scholarship changed her life, allowing her to complete her nursing degree. Today, she and Wayne are committed to paying it forward, ensuring that other students have the same opportunities. Curl's journey from a determined nursing student to a dedicated professional in the healthcare field is nothing short of inspiring. After graduating, she worked at Riverside County General Hospital where she met her husband. They later moved to Tacoma, WA, where she continued her education, earning a bachelor's degree in nursing in 1981. She spent 21 years in home health, focusing on recruitment and staff development before retiring in 2002.

The impact of Curl's generosity is mirrored by several other key RCCD Foundation contributions:

Carpenter Foundation: Their steadfast commitment includes an annual grant of \$40,000 to Performance Riverside, totaling \$466,300 in contributions.

Terra Foundation for American Art: Supported the unique Out of the Archive: Works by Miné Okubo project with a \$75,000 grant at the RCCD Center for Social Justice and Civil Liberties.

Arthur N. Rupe Foundation: Provided \$49,140 to the School of Nursing, bringing their total support to \$244,140.

Roberta Hamersma Trust: Donated \$62,067.82 to Norco College to endow a fund supporting Foster Youth.

Edison International Foundation: Contributed \$20,000 for STEM education at Riverside City College and \$25,000 for the Fire Safety program at Moreno Valley College, bringing the company's total donations to \$448,714.45.

Other significant donors include the Corona-Norco Unified School District, the City of Moreno Valley, Jan Steiner, Inland Empire Community Foundation, U.S. Bank, United Way of the Inland Valleys, and Bruce and Julie Ford.

As the RCCD Foundation reflects on this historic year, Kaatz said, "It is clear that through the power of community and the dedication of individuals like Wayne and Jane Curl, the future of education at RCCD is brighter than ever."



The resolution affirms the District's intentions of maintaining the land's integrity and the Tongva (Gabrieleno), Cahuilla, Payómkawichum (Luiseño), Serrano and Cupeño tribes' legacy.
